Message from the Acting Principal

This week we have celebrated Tongan Language Week and I would like to thank our Pasifika group for sharing and celebrating the Tongan culture with us.

In writing my last newsletter as Acting Principal, I have been reflecting on how well our kura has functioned in what has been a challenging year for our community. I am incredibly proud of where we are at as a school academically, in our engagement and successes in the areas of sports and the arts, in our students readiness and willingness to be ambassadors and leaders in many facets of our school and Kahui Ako life, and in our community for the belief we all show in our young people to do great things. Yesterday in our staff photo, we wore a red ribbon to remember Mr McKinley. I think he too would be proud of his kura this year. Our thoughts are with the students, staff and community at Kelston Girls this week whose Principal, Mrs Sarah Stenson, passed away.

As you will see in this newsletter, It has been a busy start to Term 3. Most importantly, we are very much looking forward to our new Principal, Mr Rakesh Govind, joining us in the coming weeks. Subject Selection

Our Year 10, 11 and 12 students are currently in the process of selecting subjects for next year. These were due by today. You can help us at home by asking to see their subject selection sheet, looking at SchoolPoint together and exploring the pathways that certain subjects can take them, and ensuring your child has completed this process not just on the paper sheet but also electronically on SchoolPoint. Subject choices will be discussed this Tuesday at mentoring appointments.

Mentoring Day

This coming Tuesday is Mentoring Day for our senior students. If you have not done so yet, please book an appointment for you and your child. This is an opportunity to discuss subjects for 2025, academic results and goals to date, and then importantly preparation for school examinations.

Derived Grade examinations

12 to 18 September are our school examinations. Attendance at these is compulsory and provides your child with preparation for both exam techniques and an insight into the depth of knowledge required for success in the externals. These examinations replicate what could be expected in the NCEA

examinations in November, provide a derived grade should this be required, and is used toward academic grades for prizegiving. You can help at home by checking if your child has a revision plan organised, and encouraging them to get started now if they have not already done so.

Self-Managing Students

Last newsletter I wrote about the importance of students turning up to school ready to learn with their own Chromebook, stationary, school bag and attending every day. We are noticing a large number of students are turning up late which means they are missing part of their Period 1 lesson. Please note that students do receive lunchtime detentions for lateness unless the lateness has been communicated and/or justified by a parent. We want to encourage students to manage themselves in the morning, to set their alarm earlier, to pack their lunchbox and bag the night before, catch the earlier bus, and where possible not to have to rely on anyone else to do this for them. It is their responsibility to get here on time - the two classrooms full of students on lunchtime detention yesterday tell me that our students need to improve in this self-management space.

Sports Report



A thrilling Term 3 for sports as winter sports weekly moved into knockout rounds and finals!

Netball had a wonderful run with both the seniors and the juniors, with the Year 9 girls finishing top of their grade, before unfortunately coming unstuck in their semi-final. Senior Team 1 however put all of their final pieces together, as things started to click in the last few weeks. A dominant semi-final win over a Rangitoto team set up tomorrow's Final against Westlake 9, which will surely be an exciting finish to the North Harbour season and perfect preparation for the upcoming UNIS tournament.

Both Hockey Boys & Girls had strong starts to the season, seeing them promoted into North Harbour Grade 2. Despite shaky starts against the increasingly strong opposition, both teams eventually found their feet to finish the season strongly, with the Boys playing off in the 3rd/4th play-off next week. Following that, the mixed Hockey team will head off to Whakatane for a week to compete in the Wollaston Trophy.

Basketball next, and with eight teams there was always likely to be some excitement, and there was with four of those teams making semi-finals and some very close ones at that! U19B Boys had a thrilling contest against Vanguard in their semi, falling short by just two points. Junior A went one closer, but still fell short in their semi, losing by one point to a Rosmini side. There is one final to look forward to next week however, Junior B will face Albany Junior in Wednesday's final.

More semi-final action for a number of our students in Rugby. Four of the Glenfield College Boys featured in the Northcote/Birkenhead/Glenfield 1st XV composite team, that fell three points short of beating Westlake Boys 2nd XV in a brilliant game in horrendous conditions!

Football Girls finished in Term 2, but the boys saved some of their more exciting performances for the end of the season. Team 1 involved in multiple high-scoring games, after beating Hobsonville Point 3-0, what followed were two exciting encounters, that despite losing 3-4 to TGS & 4-6 to Rosmini! Boys Team 2 finish their season tomorrow morning against Rangitoto Y11 B.

Elsewhere, seven students competed in the Auckland Climbing Series Bouldering Round. ACS is a four round event held throughout the year, with this particular round focussed on the bouldering discipline, held at BoulderCo, Westgate. Miles Malaki was the pick of the bunch, taking the silver medal in the Junior class.

Last week also saw four students endure the long trek out to Bruce Pulman Park, to compete in the Auckland Secondary Schools Road Race Championships. Students competed over three or four km depending on their age group, with all of our students placing well within the top 30, among fields of well over 50!

Summer sports will start to ramp up from here out, so watch this space!

What makes this pathway different?

- Fees paid for.
- \$12,500 stipend.
- On the job training. Trainee teachers will work in one school for an entire year with a Mentor.
- There will be an opportunity to experience another school for a 5 week placement.
- Trainee teachers will complete academic papers through the University of Waikato throughout the year.

What are the entry requirements?

- Undergraduate degree in relevant subject area (Level 7 NZQF).
- Interview with school.
- Literacy and Numeracy test through Waikato University.

For Te Reo Māori, Pasifika Studies and Technology, relevant experience may be sufficient. Trainee teachers will be accepted on a case-by-case basis. The general framework is:

 High levels of te reo Māori or Pacific Language fluency that would enable them to teach up to and including Level 3 NCEA.

or

 A minimum of 5 years of relevant work experience, in the last 8 years, in a trade (e.g. chef, patternmaker, builder, mechanic, cabinetmaker, illustrator) relevant to teaching technology education subjects.


