Year 9 & 10 Camp







Literacy & Numeracy Corner



Pasta Information

This is part of the information on a 500 gram packet of pasta.

Servings per pack: 3

Serve size: 167 g

Nutrient	Average quantity per serve	Average quantity per 100 g
Fat		
Total	0.3 g	0.18 g
Saturated	0.03 g	0.02 g
Sodium	668 mg	400 mg

Using the information per serve, what percentage of the total fat is the saturated fat?

The National Health and Medical Research Council (NHMRC) has set an 'adequate intake' of 460–920 mg of sodium per day.

Below are some statements about the information provided.

Click on 'True' or 'False' for each statement.

Statement	True	False
The amount of sodium in <i>two</i> serves of the pasta exceeds the maximum NHMRC daily 'adequate intake'.		
The maximum NHMRC daily 'adequate intake' of sodium is less than one gram.	0	0

Answers:

The correct answer is 10% because 0.03 is one-tenth of 0.3 and one-tenth as a percentage is 10%.

Alternatively,
$$\frac{0.03}{0.3} \times 100\% = 0.03 \times 100\% \div 0.3 = \frac{0.03 \times 100}{0.3}\% = \frac{3}{0.3}\% = 10\%$$

The correct answer for part A is 'True' because two serves of the pasta contains 668 mg \times 2 = 1336 mg, which exceeds 920 mg, the upper value of the NHMRC range.

The correct answer for part B is 'True' because 1 g = 1000 mg. The upper value of the NHMRC range, 920 mg, is less than 1000 g.

A busy start to Term 4 with Cricket, Futsal and Volleyball leading the way!

In Week 4, Glenfield College took seven teams to compete in the North Harbour Junior Beach Volleyball Day. On a beautifully sunny day at Mairangi Bay Beach Volleyball Club, several volleyballers had their first-ever taste of beach volleyball. In teams of two, they competed through pool play and into play-offs, with a few teams picking up victories in the sand. While undoubtedly a fun experience, the lessons learned, and new skills attempted will surely support some of our future volleyball players and teams.



Junior Volleyball wrapped up the competition for the year last week. Glenfield College had four teams competing across the different grades; a Boys & a Girls team in both the North Harbour Super League and North Harbour League. In the Super League, the boys had a very successful campaign, beginning the season in Division G, and promoting to Division D. A season that included a seven-game winning streak at one stage, and a final placing within the top 10. The Super League

Girls had a season of improvement, after a shaky start, a consistent run of performances saw them maintain their division right up until the last week, where two wins to round out the season saw them finish inside the top 20. This week, the Boys and Girls Volleyball teams headed off to the Junior Auckland Championships.



A new North Harbour Futsal league started in Term 4, with Glenfield College entering three Boys' teams into this competition. A version of Football that is played inside with six players on each team, with a smaller, heavier ball that promotes skills and quick play. The boys started out intending to hone their skills through to off-season, to support their football campaign in 2025 but ended up taking to Futsal impressively quickly. 
